

The Origins of Kitwanga.

Chief Smedik and Alfred Sinclair, 1923, Kitwanga.

Fiddler's Creek

The first village where the people lived was ḡt̄anḡ.ε̄.t "people of the walking stick", on the creek kse ḡunḡ.ε̄.t (named from a rock at its source which looks like a walking stick or cane).

? The place where they had come from was Fiddler's Creek (west side of Skeena about 25 miles below Kitwanga). Part of this village spoke Tsimshian, the other part Gitksan, but the village had only one chief, my ancestor, liḡine'te. There were in ḡt̄anḡ.ε̄.t some lax̄ski'k, some lax̄ki.bu, some ganha'dz, and some ḡisq.a'st. The people killed some animals: bears, beavers, and took them as ad̄.x̄s and iye'ts [?] The git̄sange'm killed a beaver; he cut it down the middle and they took a part and my forefather took a part. They also killed the white master. galnu? was a lax̄ki.bu, second in rank to liḡine'te.

Some of the people drifted (moved?) up river and started the village of lax̄antge'.is, across the river from Kitwanga, near the slough. There were five houses of smqiget and others of lekax̄kiget. The houses, in order from downriver upward, were 1. q̄sqx (headchief)

2. tewa'lasu

3. sq̄a'ye'n

4. t̄ki.laws

5. m̄sg.ana'.zo

6. ten̄nḡet

7. ts̄.ts (w̄t̄.tsu)

The people then moved across here to kse'tax (Kitwancool Creek) where salmon were plentiful

At a later date they moved to the *ta'sdəzəp* to live with *negt*. The first tribe to join him there were the eagles of *lax axt g̓e'*'is. There were five houses on the *ta'sdəzəp*:

1. *q̓aq* (*laxskik*)
2. *t̓wala's* ("")
3. *tengwax* (*laxse'l*) same as *negt*
4. *taktsa'x* ("") another family
5. *tenomget* (*laxkib*)

In *Tenomget*: "This family of *laxkib* joined with the *laxskik*; they were only a few. They helped each other. The *laxkib* could not marry a *laxskik* here, only the *g-anhads*. That family was not quite *laxkib*, only half. The *laxskik* and *laxkib* here were named differently: *lax'na'-dəzə*", only one name for the two. (This term is in the old language, it has the same meaning as *laxskik*, in the old gitksan language long ago *laxna'dəzə* meant *laxskik*)

The people moved from the *ta'sdəzəp* and lived along the creek. There were 11 smokehouses:

They built two *t'in* (wers) and 4 *galiag* (hanging —) which belonged to

1. *wixske'k*
2. *q̓aq*
3. *lə-łt*
4. *hal̓-ist*

The Kitwancool also built traps and had
6 galag.

As the wars were finished the tribe moved from
the creek to the present site of Kitwanga.
(Interpreter Sinclair said his grandfather lived on the
tribe when he was young. He died about 1888)

They built new houses along the Skeena, where
Sanper's house now stands. The river cut away
gitwang.e' the bank, and they had to move farther down. The
village was called gitwang.e' The houses were:-

1. q̄q
2. te'ngwax
3. tewa'l'asu
4. ha'.lus
5. le.ita
6. sqayen
7. q̄.lawz'
8. 'ax g.>t
9. ha'lu
10. tenonget
11. f̄.ts
12. taku

There were no q̄sg.a.st here at that time

When the people moved again (because of the river cutting
away the bank). Some moved back to the creek.

The song.get families had a fish camp at andem's.1

Others, the ganhads went down to q̄sg.a.sts, accompanied
by the q̄sg.a.st family of haxpagwstu from qitsgukla.

About 25 years ago they built their houses where
Kitwanga now stands. They built two rows of houses

than one near the poles and the other at the present place.
