1835 Jan 29 St Archouhlen - Feb 7
 Feb 10 St Simpson Dr Kennedy, Mr Borne
 Feb 19

1835 Feb 21 Got into Kygarney and anchored in the second harbour
 with a village a piece below & another a piece above us...
 Many of these people have been on different other hunting
 [expeditions] to California and came round by the
 Sandwich Islands... " p 20

March 10 - left Kygarney.

May 10 off Skidegates harbour.

off Skiddinas harbour

Caw-welth which live a little farther up the Sound
 have got some fears. [See Work canoe Kow-welth,
 prob. Chantle].

May 11 Anchored. Bought some potatoes

"They grow a considerable quantity of potatoes
 they have several patches under cultivation
 about their villages." p 40

Potatoes

mentions "Necoon tribe, who reside at Point Rose,
 60 miles to the northward... p 41

May 13 - In the forenoon there were 28 canoes about
 the vessel in which I counted 157 Natives 30 to
 40 of whom were women and children and about 120
 men; 15 canoes off to Pass, 10 men each, it would
 make 150

vs 'Jones' party

32 Apr 3 upper harbor of Kygaony.

May 5. C S James - traded lot of skins.

p41 May 13 - Skedigate 120 men in canoe.

15 canoes to Naas @ 10 ea 150

[270] does this agree with Census?

p49 June 8. Misset Indians went off at noon. Their Old Chief, (the Old scoundrel Kinsky, who was the head and active head at pillaging the Vancouver... said we are friends now and that when a vessel went to Necoon he would give some beaver skins...

50 June 12. A Kygaony Indian of some note, Cogill, arrived... fleeing a massacre...

52 June 17 a chief Neshoot

58 July 16 One of the Chiefs, Hagigh, though he is an old man & has 4 or 5 wives already, is in love with a young girl, Cogill's stepdaughter, -- (couldn't have her) Cogill afraid - finally takes off)

68 Aug 22 Elgigh & party arr. from Seal Hts, all drunk.

71 Aug 25 Elgigh in drunken frolics again, abusing Dr K, his p in law

Work Journal Jan - Oct 1835

p 10 At Astoria (George) Dec 15 1834 Work found Dryad newly arrived from Perth.

He learned that - - - the schooner Vancouver, had been driven ashore and wrecked on Point Rose, & C 1 s, the previous March."

Lama - Jan 20 → north.

p. 21 Mon Feb 23 - at Kygarny

Capt Duncan was here just before he lost the vessel
p. 37 Capt Alexander Duncan was capt. of Vanco
Exonerated from all blame, he was placed in command of the Cadboro.

p. 22 Capt Packard & Geo. Whitmore (1/2 br) went from Kygarny to lend a hand

"But on arrival at the place nobody was to be seen and the vessel was broke up. From what these people learned from the Indians, it was most unfortunate that they abandoned the vessel as soon as they did, for the next tide she floated off to be anchor & might easily have been saved - - -"

Natives say "only 8 were on the ground, and in order to intimidate the crew, they kindled a great number of fires in the night - - -"

The Indians who took the property have enriched themselves buying slaves &c.

p. 40 Alidgate - they to come aboard, as they are connected with tribe who plundered Vanco. Indians are off to Ft S. to exculpate themselves for that matter.

p 41 The Nocom tribe, who reside at Point Lise, . . .

p 48 Three Masats . . . pillaged the Vancouver . . .

p 49 June 8

"The Masat Indians went off about noon. Their
Old Chief, (the Old scoundrel Kinsly, who was the
head and active hand at pillaging the Vancouver)
(came to make ^{up} place, wanted to give back some of
his blunders - but wouldn't come onto
fort - Wort would have shot him anyway -

[Whitworth - sic]

p 24 Ref to "Massito" - as one who plundered the Vancouver
Stayed a long time at Kargani, until March 10.
