Twelis on the Kitwitske Dz' tribe."

This tribe now extinct had a territory on the Skeena and it was a small river running into the Skeena River. The river and territory ~~was~~ ^{was} common territory. Very little is known of them excepting that at one time when the royal Laxskok house of Sqagwest became extinct and only one man survived whom the people did not want as he was not wealthy or a good leader but half-witted while the Gitans people were thus divided a Laxskok man who was the father of Naschumick of the Siludzan came over from among the Gitwitsabe people to become a Gitans. He brought over a copper shield and put this on Sqagwest's body and announced he had come to stand in his brother's place. So that there must have been a royal Laxskok on the Gitwitsabe tribe. This Sqagwest then assumed the name on the Gitans at Kstsos and then when all were at the Nass river he announced that he was going to erect a Totem pole to commemorate his brother and invitations were sent to all the tribesmen and

gitxata and when they came to the village of port Simpson. The gitxata people who had been taunting the ~~gitwilksab~~ gitwilksab people as to the origin of their gitwilksab chief, were called upon to erect the pole. This is the present pole which stands gamnogaisk. pole of sqaswet. this pole was carved by niastag nos. assisted by gam'a yam of the git'ando. The man then sqaswet announced that he was a git'ando and was of the same origin as the extinct house of sqaswet in this manner the last house was perpetuated on the git'ando. The last of the gitwilksab died several years ago. The reason that they became so few in number was jealousy sprung up about their women folks and resulted in a war among themselves. The survivors then went to their nearest neighbor which was the giladzaw.
