I House of xpiłək (Taxiskiłək)

: xpiłək and niswə'mak - ground floor Taxstək

Sheppard: gave name lists for "legəx house, subdivided into: 1. that of legəx, 2. that of niswə'mak.

- legəx and niswə'mak at the beginning were brothers (not real brothers, but their mothers were sisters) It seems that they started two houses about the same time.

- other royal house tkwil'axe'. [Ic] They were too many in niswə'mak's house, so this tkwil'axe' built a house of his own.

gitnagunaks

- Clah : t'anks house subdivided (a) t'anks (b) n̄os̄ne·tsk
 (c) tsāyamse'gisk (d) g.e.ks

t'anks as a gitnagunaks house; have the gitnagunaks as their myth; other gitnagunaks here:

kwityuhw'usk and tsāyamse'gisk; They were all originally one house at gidoastsu (gitnagunaks) t'anks was the head house; n̄os̄ne·tsk came out first; then tsāyamse'gisk, and then kwityuhw'usk

The gitwilḡts wut'sint does not originally come from gitnagunaks, they come from the vicinity of there. They are the same myth now. The house of t'anks and wut'sint are not closely connected; content is not closely connected with any of the real gitnagunaks, only as a gispeñndwada; all could use one or two coats of the gitnagunaks.

Sheppard :

5 houses here trace their ancestry from nagunaks:

- (1) t'anks (2) tsāyamse'gisk (3) n̄os̄ne·tsk
 (4) sugūne'at (5) 'ati'ad̄ks (all gispax̄l̄ts)

They were all one family first, but being too crowded they separated into several houses. tsāyamse'gisk was the first house subdivided. Also trace their ancestry to nagunaks (6) n̄iss'ōmāye' (staying now at Metlakatla; some of his relatives are here, wut'sint) (a) n̄iss'ōmāye' is a gidoastsu) There was a (gitwilḡts) house of n̄iss'ōmāye' (7) wut'sint (gitwilḡts). This is about all of those that came from nagunaks here. Some other people here claim that they came from nagunaks but they really came from gidoastsu, that is a place near nagunaks

Johnson: Myth of origin - naganaks myth.

... when they came out of the monster (hence begins the differences in the myth) there were three in the canoe.

[— then long myth applying to Tayaaxai'tsk and Iens, leaving Gedestsu, forming Graparts, etc.]

* When the naganaks came here, Tamks group separated into another house. The above tradition does not apply to Tamks. The name of Tamks appears only when the Graparts began to live on the salt water. All the people of the Guanhut gidasstu (gitnagunaks) put themselves with one group, that of Iens and Tayaaxai'tsk. When they multiplied and became numerous they began to assume names of gidasstu origin, and Tamks was one of these. The house of Tayaaxai'tsk seems to be the foremost of the three.

House of xiyo:p

(Tauxskish)

: original qispaxlots; closer relative of nias'awε'^{VI}/p;
not the same myth; related in later days.

Wellington: says same origin as sp^{VI}:xs and gawε^{XIII}/e'
& nias^{XII}no:t. He was a gwankut from Alaska,
from qadzax^It'a:n (above Ketchikan, on coast)
They don't know of Taxweyp Taxskuk here.

Cook: House of xiyo:p (a) xiyo:p (b) wi:pambu'.
gawεle has the same myth, although they were 2 independent houses.

Swanson: puts xiyo:p with nisqandzis (qilodzay)
nisxt^I: (qitandz)

originally all one house.

All share standing beaver door pole.

House of suha'lait (gispawadwads)

Arthur Wellington : He was a gwankuit gispawadwade from Alaska, and went up the Nass and lived at *k5>d2>*, along the Nass (among the *Nug. e'*) After that he came to Metlakatla and lived with the g-spax lots. Before the deluge he was also from *t'm lax'am*. The gitnaguaks never were *t'm lax'am*. They have no story as to their flight from Alaska. They fled from Alaska at the same time as *nisswa'mak*. There was a large community of all crests from Alaska, who all fought against each other, and all left at the same time and came south. *suha'lait*, *ni'swits*, *t3amks*, *nids hāna'ax*, *waxa't*, *hatgepk*, *gamayem* (Gwankuit) *gispagts*, *1E'is*, *watiwe'lp*, *wig'e't* was also gwankuit from Alaska, same as *Ah'e'l'e't*.

Arthur Wellington Clah : House of *suha'lait* (b) *hatgepk* (c) *watiwe'lp*; were from *t'm lax'am*; use the *gao'a* myth. They are of the same origin as *tsyebase'* and others. They were not royal because they had not the wealth to command that position. He was not from any of the few *t'm lax'am* chiefs but had a separate house there. They must be closely connected with *gao'a* as they have the name of *gao'a* in this house as a woman's name, and in this house alone of all the *t'm lax'am* groups. He has the same myth as the royal chiefs.

[Clah's wife:] But from *t'm lax'am* they became *gitksad2x* in the Nass (*klo'soms*) (not far from saltwater). He is a *gitksad2x*; originally *suhalait* and *wig'e't* came from *t'm lax'am* and became *gitksad2x*. These ^{giths}_{2x} were huge people... Mrs W. says they use the name of *gao'a* and the myth to show they originate from Husky. The myth of *gao'a* belongs only to 3 houses she knows of (a) *suhalait* and *wig'e't*

(b) *gispagw'i't* (of Nass, *gitkwonsetk*)

Johnson: a wek̓et of suhalait, gitksədəx

Wellington:

wi'g̓et was the leader of the two houses of his and of suhalait. They came originally from təmlax'am and went to kṣədəx and were 'nisq̓e'

Always a separate house from suhalait. Suhalait used their names only after house extinct.

Wellington: "His origin is somewhere on the plateau on the headwaters of the Skuna. He came to the village of the Gitksan from further away inland. There are three different houses of wi'g̓et; wi'g̓et g̓as̓al̓ats, a wi'g̓et on the Nass, and one Gitksan; all have the same myth of origin. They ~~joined~~ joined the tanlax'am group, when came. Never ~~joined~~ joined the gitksədəx. No close relatives here at all. They have now amalgamated with house of suhalait, for lack of numbers, now extinct. Their main crest before joining the tanlax'am was the modišk. He took the modišk after have joined the tanlax'am. Don't know whether he had the crest before."

Wellington came with n̄is̄wa'mak although not closely related

House of g.amayem

(gispowadwada)

g.amayem and ts'amiks, T'nlakam gispowadwada.
Use the gao'a myth but are of the likakiget class.
Came at same time as royal.

Wellington: from t'mlax'am originally; from there went to Alaska and became the gwunhert, and then joined g.spaxlts. But they did not go to gitksandz as the suhalait group did, but went through to the Skuna and then joined the g.spaxlts. Not of the same family as suhalait (not w'e'k'e't) but of the same gwunhert group of gispowadwade.

Toss Wellington says that these people did not have the 'nest' as crest in former times, as they were from temlaxam. The main crest of the suhalait group only was the he'st as well as of all the gitksandz people of the Nass now. The midisk was the main crest of g.amayem gwunhert group who did not have the he'st at all.

They were all from the house of g.amayem originally. They were t'mlax'am but not royal chiefs there; the gao'a myth is not used by this house. Not related to the house of suhalait exc that they were gispowadwads.

M Johnson: original g.spaxlts gisp, more closely connected with the t'nlakam group than any other.

Wallace ts'amiks uses grouse (maxme'x) crest, revealing his interior origin

Wellington: In telling their origin they only mention the fact they are from Temlakam, and no more. Another subdw. (e) gisq'z-s

(who) have not the power to take the gallants and
use it.
