"sailed at Cape Ball and Yelking, near Tow Hill" Gilman p 181

7 1/2 -

"made Skidegate his headquarters" (Harrison)

1842 Skidegate - Canada (Harrison)

15 -

1851 Gold: Ft Simpson, Skidegate, Kootenai.

1852 - Kootenai Sept - American Struggles (Dalzell) - lived at Kootenai

May 20-25? Vranga & Portland (Halla)

1853 Aug 14-18 Vancouver - Hillier Gilman p 112

Sept 7 Vranga - E. at Kayam

Sept 17 " - E at Vranga Sch. (planning to move to Kung)

1859 29 Capt Torrens party went prospecting with Edensaw (Mayne p 180)

Assumed 1860 June 14 in Victoria

Jan 6-13 Fort Simpson - E's brother dead - started for home

1860 Sumner Alex met E. and his tribe at Nanaimo, going to Victoria Nanaimo July 31

1861 Apr. 5-8 Victoria (attempt to murder Sgt Blake)

Aug 7 1861 Falling from space - Alouet - Victoria

1862 Smallpox - June 12 Edensaw & Cadboro Bay on way home

1875 carved Stutta pole at Masset (Melinger)

1876 made peace at Masset, from Kung. Took Gilman to Skidegate

1878 Yatza (Saween)

1882 moved into Masset (Jacobson) O'Keddy - Yatza - lived Wee-ah's house

1883 Swan

1884 at Masset (Christiansen)

1890 death of son George Cowhol.

1894 died, Masset 16 Nov 1894

Edenshaw

Will give as much history of the successive Edenshaws as we have, because they could have been artists too.

Name: id ʔ'nso

Boas 1898 E'dENSA (= glacier)

Walbran p 162 - name derived from a Tl. word meaning "melting ice from a glacier," literally, "wasting away, nothing left of it," i.e., "Waterfall". (From CFN and Harrison)

Vertical File (anon) - E-den-so which in lang. of Ft Wrangell Indians means waterfall.

Oregon: Walbran p 162 "Edenshaw's ancestors came from the neighbourhood of the Stikine river, generations ago." (From CFN and Harrison)

Name does not appear in numerous logs of 1789-1790's

Early Edenshaws: 1809 - predecessor of AEE

1809 - mention of name at GC1

1817 - ^{Masset} ~~Koke~~ - "head chief of Masset"

1829 - chief of the Masset tribe

- "Old Edenshaw" - uncle of AEE Swanton - had home at Kusta
Harrison -
Stearns - wrested chieftanship from Stikine.

before Gen. Douglas - James M Reid.

14-15 Aug 1853

- on Point Howe about $\frac{3}{4}$ mile from the extreme end
despatched Chief Matis and Francisco to Ft Simpson
at 3 am

Beaver came to W. side of point on 16th.

on 17th B ran around pt to east side.

- at 3 pm a number of Indians arrived and started
pillaging the cargo and using threatening language pointing
their guns and flourishing their knives. A quarrel ensued
between the Chief and the Interpreter, which was very nearly
ending seriously.

At 6 pm abandoned vessel

18th. observed Indians plundering the ship and carrying
the cargo along the sands - - went in armed boats - -
ship a complete wreck - - so went on Beaver

"having quit before leaving set fire to the wreck in
order that the large quantity of Spirits and Wines
on board might not fall into the hands of the Indians
who had threatened their lives and traded their exertions
to save the vessel - - arr. Ft Simpson 7:30 am
evening.

p 49. "The brig Vancouver, which was wrecked at Rose Spit in August, 1853, was a comparatively new vessel, having arrived from England in May. In August she left for Fort Simpson in command of Captain Red. [James M.]

--- A boat was sent to Fort Simpson, and the Beaver was dispatched to the scene. The Indians claimed the wreck, but Captain Dodd, ^{with the interests of the HBC in mind} after drenching her with oil set fire to her. (Capt Red deceased. Capt Swanson, the pilot, exonerated) [Capt Dodd of Beaver]

Colombia, Apr 6 '61 p 33
"Seven years ago Capt James Red was wrecked on the HBC ship Vancouver, and went ashore to see Eden, said to be a red country. Capt Red & son dropped ship on fire to prevent plundering it."

--- She made several successful trading voyages to the north, but was finally wrecked in 1852 on the northern shore of Queen Charlotte's Island."
