Summary of

The Beaver Poles of Neeskawdeks

Two Beaver poles (<sup>one on Fortress</sup>, one on island) belong to nisq'adaks  
of gitxan group of laxskid.

The people lived at git'ans. A short distance above there, there was a lake where the hunters got beavers. One morning kwangat of the laxskid house of nisnagwak was found dead with an arrow sticking in him. After his cremation, while the people were gambling, a stranger in a beaver robe came and took the arrow "of his brother pithamgw'a", dove in the lake and became a beaver. The people decided to wreck the dam, and two laxskid lakakiget named laxaya'-aux and haxsu'msk killed the Beaver Chief. The house of nisq'adak took this Beaver as crest. and it is represented on their pole (the tallest one on the Fortress).

The older pole was erected <sup>by</sup> old nisq'adaks  
the newer .. .. ca 1886, Haikam st /  
restored 1929

After the lake was drained the people moved from git'ans to the Fortress (better fishing). The gitxtsex, who had lived at the edge of the beaver lake, moved down to the canyon also, other side. gitlaxtsit ta'x "people on edge of lake" is a qanamx term. gitlaxdzidz "people on ravine" is (the group at Fortress)

## Summary of "Origin of the Beaver Crest"

One morning q̄en̄y did not get up from his sleeping place, and he was found to be dead, a wonderfully carved bone arrow in him. His nephews gave a feast, at which the arrow was passed around, and two strange men said it was the arrow of b̄alangwe. They left with the arrow, and pursued, jumped into the lake and became two large beavers.

The people prepared poles to break the huge dam.

nīshaiwexs, git̄x̄n, ḡm stayed on one side, k̄en̄y, nīst̄x̄y, sedzan on the other. When the dam broke and the ordinary beavers were killed, the huge beaver with human heads on its back appeared. sedzan (gan) speared it first, then git̄x̄n, and git̄x̄n got it. (Monster beavers wife escaped to a whirlpool kwed̄ḡn)

k̄en̄y, nīst̄x̄y, and sedzan went up to the edge of what was then the lake, and were known as git̄lax̄t̄set̄te abbr. git̄k̄t̄sext̄

nīshaiwexs, ḡm, and git̄x̄n (on railroad side) made their village on a high hill right above first tunnel known as lax̄galwelp

Then all moved down to ̄ndudun and the beavers undermined the village.

Then git̄k̄t̄sext̄ moved up to k̄ts̄m̄nahusk and the others<sup>up</sup> to a place on a precipice git̄w̄lm̄y (people of falling leaves). (above the canyon)

Then for protection both groups moved back to the canyon, the git̄lax̄d̄z̄ (people at edge of precipice) to ts̄lom t̄d̄z̄p and the git̄lax̄t̄sext̄ to the site of their original village.

And git̄x̄n became afterwards the head of all the q̄itsalas houses - - -

 of much strife with the q̓ispax̕l̕ts, as legex wanted  
 it. It caused them to move onto the tədəzəp, and a  
 woman was all ready to take it into the hills in event of  
 an attack. It was the only amhalait in the tribe at  
 the time. Many attacks were made.

It was supposedly erected by a lone woman survivor of gitx̓n called gawgantk in memory of gitx̓n, at a time when they borrowed people of the house of laqex to revive the house.
