p 565 "Its name, Yakway, sounds like Thingit" H.R. of Tean St'inlanaws, who had their headquarters there. Kakyac & Rhi were warriors there

no Tian [This is probably the "Too" of Work's census. Too seems to mean "west coast", as Swanton translates Dō gitana'-i Ezo as West Coast Kitans and Dō sl'an Inagai R15d as West Coast Bear Town People. Swanton gives 2 houses of Ezo at Yakun and 3 houses of R15d, of a total of 8. He says R15d owned Yakun after Ezz Salandas moved from there to Alaska. He also says R15d are offshoot of R15 Bear Town who went to west coast, where after migration of Kargani they were the principal Raven family. He lists R15d as owner of site, Chief XI.

Boas lists these two To families (toqyt'ina'i and tost'eng, Inagai) with Kineta, adds that these two "belong to the village Too of Dawson".

Alfred Adams (above) said Yakun belonged mostly to Tian St'inlanaws (R15d) who had their headquarters there.

2 Kivsta

S side Larry Passage just e. of Meares Pt.

(IR 15 Kivosta)

1788 Wm Douglas falls in with chief Blakow - Coneehaw, exchanges names

Swanton. K!i'ta'stA "where the trail comes out" Chief Edenshaw E 21
(Gunita' E18 chief mascot)

1791 Ingraham visited the village in "Cunneyah's absence, with Cow, July chief of Adens who usually lived at Kyganj. Examined 2 40 foot totem poles

1792 July - returned to same anchorage. Cunneyah came aboard, tried to prevent him from going to Kargani to see Cow & Eoi by saying they were dead. But Eoi arrived and said "~~the~~ Cow" had withdrawn his tribe from Cunneyah's and lived on the main [land] at a place called Kyeunnee".

Swanton's informants could remember 9 houses in 1900

Dawson Aug 1878 deserted about 10 yrs - seems to have been a place of great importance
Edenshaw's village at time of Douglas visit about 12 houses

Barbeau VII p 567⁴ Alfred Adams 1939 told of beautiful grave there. One house belonged to Albert Edenshaw, another to [Tsihtendzaws] head of Stastes before rise of Edenshaw. Captain Douglas exchanged name with chief who "belonged to the family that was later to have Edenshaw as its headchief" 7564 Swanton p 293, house just west of Skt'ina'as:
