Albot to Bynon, 1927. Dispute over g.alkma'ti crest with he.l.

g.alkma'ti (mountain goat headdress). This crest belonged to this house, having been brought with them from Lemlahem. He.l of g.itxa'ta also claimed it, and on one occasion shamed suhala'it by ^{displaying} ~~dancing~~ with the g.alkmati and then "throwing it away" as though it had no value.

T.P.

The following year suhala'it gave a feast and erected his Mountain Goat totem pole (Pt. Simpson). Then he too displayed the g.alkmati, ^{and} threw it in the fire along with two coppers to show his disregard for wealth. he.l was present, but has never taken up this challenge, so that this crest belongs to suhala'it and not to him.

They say (Wellingtons) that wige't and subalait started at Lemladam before going to ksɔdɔɔ, and that the mɔdi:k was their original crest. It is mentioned in a song "the grizzly bear walking down the river", which belongs to ^{cd}Isab g'amayem and tsamks, g'isgɔ'ts, |ɛ'is. wige't, subalait

wige't saw this being from his canoe at ktsɔma'us, a mɔdi:k with a double bodied being on its head.

Abstract: Myth of gwusyaqagalye'n crest of xne's,
laxkibu, qispaxl'ots.
Mrs Wellington to Beynon, 1915.

The wife of k'e'xk, of the house of xne's, went into the hills berry-picking each day, and she was also having an illicit love affair with a naxnax known as getwe'nsk (woodpecker). This being had a beautiful robe covered with shellfish. Growing suspicious, her husband followed her and shot her lover with his bow and arrow. As it died, it turned into a woodpecker. The husband took the robe home and gave it to xne's, the head of the house.

That night, a woman's voice outside the back of the house wailed for her son and demanded back the robe. The young man shook the robe over the fire (thus ~~returning~~ sending it to the supernatural world), and the woman's voice acknowledged it and gave permission for it to be used as a crest. xne's took it as an ^{exclusive} crest, made it in the form of a mdi:k, and called it gwusyaqagalye'n.
