gilawo'

(laxskik)

Men

1. gilawo' means to pass up someone in the invitations to a feast

2. Oregon: The man concerned was a great warrior, and the sole chief at gitanget, which was so large a village that the people could bring down a flock of ducks by shouting at them. Right after the deluge they moved across the river to antki'is. When this man came among the people of antki'is he assumed the name

'atmatxempteqt  
without any phratry

It was not as

it had been at gitanget, where he had been head chief. Here he was ~~just~~ <sup>just</sup> one of a group. So he was undecided as to which [phratry] he would join

Here he also assumed the name gilawo'. He had received an affront from the people living across the river by being passed up in the invitations, and was being ridiculed. To remove the ridicule he assumed the name gilawo' as a chief's name.

2. na'ga'lg. (as in gog house)

3. tsak' (as in sqayen's house) ✓

4. nags for hishana'gs "pretending to be a woman", naxn'ig name. Performer, masked, pretended to be a woman



Boys:

- 1. haltu (as in gog's house)
- 2. sag. etg. a bu' "all together spouting" (blackfish)

Women

sigidomnax

- 1. 'a/gam lu' tem "performer of the lutim dance", a naxnag name. The performer uses the rattle of the lutim [secret society] dance.
- 2. tsaba'ux "indifferent person", naxnag name.
- 3. indag. o' t (as in gog's house)

Girls. No separate names

naxs:

- 1. naxs ag. o' d'omg, tksan, from the naxnag name "thoughtless (reckless) Betksan" in the house of te'walasu.
- 2. naxsu'ns, from naxnag name "blind". The performer, groping around the feast-house, would compensate any chief he happened to touch.
- 3. naxstamxsa'n, from naxnag name "will gamble".
- 4. naxstambala'it, " " " " "will be balait".  
The performer went around and asked each chief to work over him in the manner of a swanasu.
